
Re: Play Time Gaming - Elector Organizations - Third Party Sponsors

I confirm receipt of your letter dated April 30th 2015.

Several aspects of your letter do not appear to be supported factually or in law.

1. An employer, by the very definition of the word, is compelled to have employees. Tom Nellis, in his in-person attendance before North Vancouver City Council confirmed that he provided a campaign contribution through his company Playtime to the election campaigns of Darrell Mussatto, and his 'Slate', whose membership is comprised of Craig Keating, Linda Buchanan and Holly Back. Similar contribution were also made to the campaigns of Kathy McGrenera, Matt Clark and Iani Makris.
2. When Tom Nellis made these statements, he was appearing before N.Van City council on behalf of Playtime Gaming, not K&T Properties Ltd., so it is reasonable to assume that he was speaking on behalf of Playtime and not K&T.
3. I have this morning spoken with WorkSafeBC. Every employer in the province must register with WorkSafeBC, and any firm engaging contractors, or associating with a valid employer is compelled to registered with WorkSafeBC as well. This includes circumstances where a donation involving paid employees is being made.
4. K&T Properties Ltd. are not a registrant with WorkSafeBC. If K&T had paid employees, to which Mr. Nellis admits in his presentation before council, then he would be deemed an employer under the Act and he would be a registrant with WorkSafeBC. So, we are forced to assume that a) either Mr. Nellis lied to N.Van City council and K&T did not provide an in-kind donation of paid employees, or b) Mr. Nellis was in fact making reference to the in-kind donation of employees provided by Playtime.
5. No reference of any form is made in any of the 'Slates' candidate filings of an in-kind donation being made by the employer Playtime.
6. Playtime did not register as a Third Party Elector organization, yet they appear to have operated a telephone call centre in Burnaby, in support of the Mayor and his 'Slate', using paid employees. Alternatively, K&T have breached the rules under WorkSafeBC legislation by having failed to register as an employer under the Act.

I hate to say this, but I am left with the impression that I am having to drag ElectionsBC into doing a full and proper investigation of the facts in this matter. I would have thought the entire



purpose of the legislation was to be proactive so that BC residents could take comfort in the fact the law was being enforced properly. You have not left me with this impression!

Mr. Nellis is being questioned by Councillor Pam Bookham beginning at 2:01:16 of the video clip, in the section titled 'Comments & Questions From Policy Committee'. Also, at 1:01 a Lottery Corp representative admits that Squamish Nation declined Playtime and Lottery Corp's enquiry for a Gaming facility. I believe this may involve a breach of the Gaming Act as certain prerequisites are necessary before such conversations may occur. Lottery Corp appear to have allowed the cart to get out front of the horse.
